Romans 8: 24-25





RISE UP against Domestic Abuse is Mothers' Union's new campaign to raise awareness about domestic abuse.

The aim is to make sure that activism against domestic abuse and gender-based violence happens 365 days a year and not just during the 16 Days of Activism campaign in November and December.

Domestic abuse can happen to anyone from any walk of life. It includes the educated, the affluent, both women and men. Abuse can and does happen anywhere. Unfortunately some people hide behind miscommunicated Bible passages to justify their actions or feel they should stay with an abusive partner. Mothers' Union wants to raise awareness that this is not OK.

So, what is happening in the Diocese of Manchester?

At the **Seven Saint's Team**, in response to the RISE up campaign, we decided to contact FortAlice our local refuge and see if we could help with anything they needed for Christmas.

We received a list of things the children had asked for, and with donations we were able to get quite a lot of the things on that list. It included 2 dolls, a box of Lego, a Football, Rugby Ball and some Crafting items.

We have also received a letter back thanking us for our donation and help in making a special Christmas for some of the children in this difficult time.

HMP Manchester

Governor O' Reilly of Visits and Reception has asked that I pass on a thank you to you all for your donations and all the kind support you have provided to HMP Manchester.

From St. Andrew's, Blackley Joan Raine gives us this update:

We feel as the only branch in North Manchester it is important that we keep sharing the news that the MU is still alive and doing great things. We are not a big branch but we tend to look out for one another and prayer is our first go to resource. COVID made such an impact on us as a church. I believe our 100th birthday is 2026 so we are aiming to celebrate that. Doris Henry, our branch leader, is having treatment for cancer at the moment so we are all trying to support her and carry on as normal. We are setting up an MU prayer and telephone rota for her.



Each year we sponsor the daffodils for Mothering Sunday which our scouts attend. We decided a few years ago that all members of our small congregation would receive a bunch as nowadays men and women are both carers and parents. We find everyone appreciates this. We wrap the bunches in fancy cellophane, attach a card and ribbon and then give everyone a MU Mothering Sunday card along with the daffs.

We have a Toddler Group, originally run by Doris our branch member. Again, COVID had a big impact on this group and the MU support by providing any toys, books, teaching aids etc. that are needed. At Christmas we supplied Christmas stockings and gifts for the children and also we have funded their end of term and Easter parties. We supplied raffle prizes for the group at Christmas and this was much appreciated by the mums and carers and they felt included in the toddler club.

We run a really big Christmas fair in November every year and it is really well supported by the local community. We see people at this event enjoying the MU hospitality. It is something where the work for it starts in mid-January and we work throughout the year collecting and making things and

receiving donations, especially toys, which are always in exceptional condition. We feel this is something our branch can do for the local community by providing reasonably priced toys that are nicely presented for sale to local families who are struggling with finances. From the proceeds of last year's Christmas fair we hope to provide new camping equipment for our young scouts as the old tents are leaking water. We class the scouts as part of our MU project of care for our church children and young people and support them in any way we can.

Are you looking for a Day Out with a Focus?



'Threads through Creation' is an astonishing textile art exhibition showing at Blackburn Cathedral from 6th March to 14th April. It might be a bit of a journey for some, but it's probably right up their street for many members – it's a real treat! The show is touring twenty cathedrals, and there has been some lovely feedback from MU members.

It consists of twelve beautiful silk panels re-imagining the story of creation from the bible. They're huge – 2.7m high, up to nearly 4m wide. It's one of the largest textile art projects by a single artist, ever. It took artist Jacqui Parkinson *three years - and eight million stitches*!

People of all ages and backgrounds love it. It's great to bring friends too. You'll find the huge scale, vibrant colours, dramatic and complex designs truly breathtaking. You've never seen anything like it ...

Admission is free (donations welcome) Blackburn Cathedral is easily accessible by car, bus or train.

The Knife Angel

... is coming to Bury.

This contemporary sculpture, made from over 100,000 seized blades, was created by Alfie Bradley and the British Ironworks Centre in 2018. 200 knife banks were made available and amnesties held so people could anonymously donate knives, whilst knives seized by police were also included. It was created in order to highlight knife crime in the United Kingdom and educate young people on the harmful effect violent behaviour can have on their communities.

Not only does the Angel act as a catalyst for turning the tide on violent and aggressive behaviour, but it also acts as a beautiful memorial designed to celebrate those lives which have been lost through these violent and thoughtless actions.

The Knife Angel will be unveiled in Bury town centre on Friday 1st March. It will stand near the intersection of The Rock and Tithebarn Street until 27th March.



- ⇒ Whilst neither of these displays are specifically Mothers' Union based we thought they would be of interest to many of our members.
- ⇒ If you go to see the Knife Angel why not visit Bury's famous market on Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays?
- ⇒ There are lots of cafés but Bury Parish Church Coffee Shop (not far from the sculpture) is open 10.30am to 2.30pm on Wednesdays and 11.30am to 1.30pm on Fridays.
- ⇒ Take the opportunity to visit the Mothers' Union Shop in St John's House just a few minutes along The Rock from the 'Angel'. Monday and Tuesdays tend to be the best days but you can always ring to check.
