The Magi visit the Messiah

After Jesus was born in Bethlehem in Judea, during the time of King Herod, Magi from the east came to Jerusalem and asked, "Where is the one who has been born king of the Jews? We saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him."

When King Herod heard this he was disturbed, and all Jerusalem with him. When he had called together all the

people's chief priests and teachers of the law, he asked them where the Messiah was to be born. "In Bethlehem in Judea," they replied, "for this is what the prophet has written:

"But you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah; for out of you will come a ruler who will shepherd my people Israel."

Then Herod called the Magi secretly and found out from them the exact time the star had appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem and said, "Go and search carefully for the child. As soon as you find him, report to me, so that I too may go and worship him."

After they had heard the king, they went on their way, and the star they had seen when it rose went ahead of them until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw the star, they were overjoyed. On coming to the house, they saw the child with his mother Mary, and they bowed down and worshipped him. Then they opened their treasures and presented him with gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to go back to Herod, they returned to their country by another route.

Reflection: Gifts

The Christmas Story tells us the shepherds brought a lamb; Christina Rossetti's poem (In the bleak mid-winter)

suggests all we need is to give our heart. But the gifts of the wise men allow us to ponder our own gifts; those given to us by God which we share with our family, our community and in our workplaces.

Is God pleased with the way we use the gifts he gave us, or do we make excuses for not using them well? Regardless of our new year's resolutions or failure at them, we must offer ourselves, our talents as well as our shortcomings. Epiphany is a good time to ask ourselves 'what is holding us back from offering our gifts to God?'

If life is old and tired and our treasures seem limited, the three wise men can provide an inspiration for the ongoing journey of faith. No-one gets chauffeur driven to Bethlehem. The on-going journey of faith might be painful, surrounded by darkness and without a star appearing even intermittently to reassure us. The magi travelled through the dark and through the wilderness and so do we on our faith journey. Like the wise men, we travel on our road through life and bring the light of the stable, of the Christ Child, with us. Our task now is to spread that light by using the gifts God has given to us.
